Benefits of conducting the Safety and Security Assessments

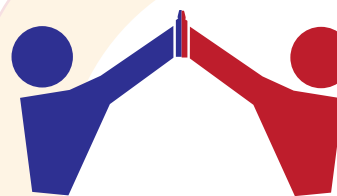
Aside from helping barangays and cities to come up with responsive programs, the conduct of the safety and security assessment using the tools will benefit local governments in other aspects such as:



1. Engage citizen participation through involvement of different groups in conducting the safety assessment.



2. Promote active communication between the communities, barangay officials and City Officials.



3. Help address issues in terms of safety and security and comply with requirements in support to the Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG).



4. May serve as a monitoring and evaluation mechanism of programs, projects and services delivered by the Local Government to the barangays.

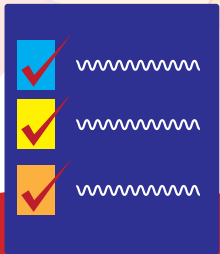

SAFETY AND SECURITY SCAN TOOLS

The **Safety and Security Scan Tools** can determine the level of safety and security of communities by looking at basic necessities and services, peace and order, governance, and environment. These tools can help leaders gain a deeper understanding of the issues and concerns on safety and security faced by women, youth, and children in the community. Also, these can provide information to support the formulation of policies, structures, systems that promote better safety and security.

1. Safety and Security Survey

- The survey contains questions which aims to know cases of abuse within and outside their homes, economic or livelihood opportunities for women, disasters experienced by the community.



2. Participatory Safety and Security Audit

- The Audit/Participatory Walk aims to gather observations of women, youth, and children in their community that can affect their safety and security (such as availability of facilities and places that are prone to flooding and fires)
- The Audit/Participatory Walk is being done twice - morning and evening
- Observations and data collected by these sectors will be plotted on a map



3. Focus Group Discussion (FGD) Guide

- Women, youth and children are gathered to discuss safety and security experiences within and outside of their homes
- Historical timeline will be produced – it contains the important events and incidences in their community like fires, flooding, and crimes



What is Safety?

Safety is the condition of being protected against physical, social, spiritual, financial, political, emotional, psycho-social, occupational, psychological, educational or other types or consequences of failure, damage, error, accidents, harm or any other event which could be considered non-desirable.

What is security?

Security, also called social safety or public safety, addresses the risk of harm due to intentional criminal acts such as assault, burglary or vandalism.

What is a Safe City according to UN-Habitat?

- A city free from Crime and Violence
= No burglary, assault, rape, homicide, terroristic attacks
- A city free from tenure insecurity and force eviction
= No forced eviction and risky socio-economic processes and factors including poverty, social exclusion, discriminatory inheritance laws, ineffective land policies, lack of planning and protection of human lives
- A city free from natural and human made/ technological disasters
= No risky events or hazards including floods, earthquakes, hurricanes, volcanic eruptions, technological disaster and wars

Secondary data will also be collected to support the results of the assessment generated by the tools.
